Industrial Action

Parents will be aware from my letters this week that the next day of industrial action by the NEU will take place on Thursday 2nd March. After assessing the risk of the situation based on anticipated staff numbers, the school will only be open for students in Year 11 and Year 13, together with a small number of our most vulnerable students who will be contacted directly over the coming days.

Year 11 students should be in school from 9.30am when they will have an assembly in the hall ahead of lessons or where teachers are not in they will be able to work through a range of independent study materials in a computer room where appropriate support will be provided. Attendance for Year 11 is compulsory and essential at this stage of their course.

Year 13 students should be in school from 11.10am where they will attend lessons where teachers will be in and for other lessons they should be in the Hub for supervised study. A limited number of students will be invited into school for Period 1 where we know teachers are in school.

School will be closed to students in Years 7, 8, 9, 10 and 12. Teachers that are not taking strike action will be in school and will be leading live lessons via Teams or setting work via Satchel One. Please ask your child to access Satchel One at 8.30am to see the work for the day. All of the information for lessons will be provided on Satchel One as a first port of call. Staff who are hosting live lessons on Teams will publish instructions via Satchel One. To access a live lesson, students should open their Teams calendar and click to join the live lesson at the start. Students should have their camera off at all times and turn on their microphone when instructed to do so by teachers. Any work that needs to be submitted should be done by following teacher instructions during the lesson.

Teachers that are taking strike action are withdrawing labour and are therefore under no obligation to set any work, although some may choose to set work for their Year 11 or 13 classes.

I am sorry that you will have to make alternative arrangements for your child at short notice and that they will experience disruption to their education. I understand that this situation may be frustrating and ask that all members of our school community continue to treat each other with mutual respect.

Bromley Rotary Clubs Youth Awards 2022-2-23

"Uplifting and joyful" says Bromley's Mayor

On Friday, January 27 about 250 proud parents, relations and friends, local MPs, and teachers filled the auditorium at the Langley Park Performing Arts Centre to celebrate the achievements of 32 young people who had each, in their own way, made a significant contribution to their community.

Too often nowadays young people are seen in a poor light but Bromley Rotary Clubs showcased how pupils, aged 11 to 18, from ten Bromley Secondary schools have unselfishly given up their own time to make a real difference to their families, their communities and local and national charities. Bromley Mayor, Cllr Hannah Gray presented each winner with a certificate and gift voucher and declared that this was one of her most uplifting and joyful appointments of the year.

This was the eighth year of the Bromley Rotary Clubs Youth Awards which has grown year on year from four participating schools to sixteen in 2022.

Winners had all done something special outside school: some, as young as 11, were caring for sick or disabled family members, others had raised considerable sums for charities or pitched in with local charities. Ethan regularly works in a local food bank and helps serve and distribute it. Millie and four colleagues work with adults on the autistic spectrum at a tree centre and on a gardening project. Abigail is a young carer for her disabled brother and has raised over £2000 for the charity that supports his condition. Sofie and her brother set up a small business to source and market environmentally friendly products.

The award winners section concluded with the first presentation of The Stuart Jack Trophy. This award commemorates one of the Bromley Rotarians who initiated the scheme and died last year. It goes to the award winner who, in the opinion of the judges, best embodies the scheme. This year it went to Abigail Jones from Harris Girls Academy Bromley.

The ceremony followed a presentation of cheques to local charities which had helped Bromley Rotary Club's Sleigh Collection raise £14,000 just before Christmas. The Sleigh partners were: St Christopher's Hospice, St Vincent De Paul Beckenham, the RNLI, the Maypole Project, 23rd Bromley Scout Group. Greener and Cleaner Bromley and the Motor Neurone Disease Association.



Trip to Krakow

"For the dead and the living, we must bear witness" Elie Wiesel

We took 40 GCSE and A level History students to Krakow for a 3 night stay on the 9th of Feb 2023. Learning about the history of the Polish People and vising Auschwitz the largest concentration camp for mass killings in the town of Oswiecim.

After landing we embarked on a walking tour of Krakow. Poland had surrendered to the Germans on the 28^{th of} September 1939 honouring the partition of Poland with Russia. Our walking tour truly explained the horrors of occupation, over 100,000 polish intelligentsia were mass shot to prevent resistance and German authorities began to persecute the Jews of the city.

On the walking tour we also saw some of the locations where Schindler's list was filmed in 1994 and the Jewish Quarter. In 1939 Poland had 3.3 million Jewish living there. At the end of the war approximately 380,000 polish Jews remained.









On the second day we visited Oskar Schindler Factory and the Jewish Museum – Having a tour detailing the atrocities that had happened in Poland. Possibly the most poignant part of the trip was meeting a Holocaust survivor. We were expecting a relative however we met Lidia Maksymowicz, who was three years old on her arrival at Auschwitz and was in the Dr Mengele experiment Block. She had survived eighteen months of hell. Her mother secretly visiting her ensured her survival, and this was her only contact with humanity. Lidia was adopted on liberation, thinking her birth parents were dead. However, in 1962 she discovered that her birth parents were alive, living in the USSR





On day 3 we visited Auschwitz, walking through the gate and seeing the words "Arbeit Macht Frei" (Work sets you free). What the students saw here will stay with them for a long time. Exhibitions and memorials in every barracks. We also saw the extended Auschwitz camp of Birkenau and the railway line that took many Jews to their death in the Gas Chambers. In just over four-and-a-half years, Nazi Germany systematically murdered at least 1.1 million people at Auschwitz. Almost one million were Jews.













On our final day before our flight home, we visited the Wieliczka Salt Mines entered in 1978 on the UNESCO World Heritage List. There are 245km of galleries, the deepest points being 327 Metres deep underground dating back from the Middle Ages.

A Big thank you to the History Staff who accompanied the Auschwitz trip, Mr Lamb, Ms Ruth, and Ms Silk. The students all had a great and memorable time that they will not forget. The lessons learnt from the **visit** to **Auschwitz** are clear: hatred has no place in the human heart.
