Ski trip—5 to 13 April 2019



It is the lasting legacy of this competition that many of the entrants study dance post 18 and continue to perform as young adults."

"The judging really does get harder every year," added Mrs Kearney. "All those that bravely took part in the show should be congratulated. I really appreciate the time, effort and commitment that went into making the competition so close."
